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# **SALUT! NEW YORK**

It promised the best — New York ballet never before seen in Ottawa, an elegant before the theatre dinner, a glittering champagne reception, a glamourous onstage party, and one-of-a-kind Dior gowns from Paris — it delivered! Credit that to Gala co-chairmen par excellence Margit Léger and Maureen Brodie, with special thanks to Merrill Lynch Canada Inc., our Major Benefactor.

From the New York City Ballet, principal dancers Heather Watts and Sean Lavery performed two Balanchine pas de deux: the technically demanding Tschalkovsky Pas De Deux, created by Balanchine in 1960 using newly discovered music from Swan Lake; and Apollo, the beautifully conceived dramatic ballet first performed in 1928 by Diaghilev's Ballets Russe. Balanchine has written «Apollo I look back on as the turning point of my life. In its discipline and restraint, in its sustained oneness of tone and feeling, the score (Stravinsky) was a revelation».

From American Ballet Theatre came Marianna Tcherkassky, Johan Renvall, Bonnie Moore and Gil Boggs who performed a selection of classical pas de deux favourites — Coppélla, Sylvia and Le Corsaire — as well as a particularly moving duet by contemporary choreographer Lynne Taylor-Corbett. The audience responded enthusiastically, applauding Marianna Tcherkassky's brisk fouettés in Le Corsaire and Johan Renvall's soaring leaps.

Theatre Ballet presented Lawrence Gradus' *Angel*, a newly produced ballet for six dancers inspired by turn-of-the-century art and circus themes. It featured dancers Gregory Dawson and Deborah Washington in a fantasy setting accomplished by Ron Snippe's dramatic lighting and François Barbeau's costumes and mirrored set.

The mood for this sumptuous evening at the National Arts Centre was aptly set by a round of gala dinner parties featuring a menu designed by Toronto chef Michael Stadtlander. Stadtländer flew in with a team of sous-chefs to assist the Salut! New York hosts and hostesses with the preparation of roast Ontario lamb with red beets/balsamic butter and creamed green onions. # **NEW YORK DEBUT-A WINNER**

«TBC's First Bite of Big Apple A Sweet One» As the headline in the Ottawa Citizen suggests, our foray to New York was a resounding success. TBC garnered bouquets from critics and New York's dance-goers as a company of impressive theatricality, professionalism and artistic strength.

Ballets such as Lawrence Gradus' Garden, featuring guest pianist Nicole Presentey, and Tribute drew enthusiastic and immediate applause from over 3,500 people for their beautiful visual settings and high-spirited dancing. Anna Kisselgoff in The New York Times praised Tribute as «showing off the women's brilliant jetés and men's energy... clear and sophisticated in structure» and Garden as «a charming makebelieve ballet, tastefully conceived».

Many of the dancers were singled out by Ms. Kisselgoff. She described Deborah Washington as «impressive in her clear attack» and Roderick Johnson as «knowing how to make us believe he was spinning fantasies out of Mr. Gradus' whole cloth». Jacques Marcil drew attention as a «strong dancer» and newcomer Emmanuelle Gill-Houpert was commended for her «lyrical strength».

TBC appeared as the third of five Canadian dance companies chosen to appear on the Metropolitan Life's Dance Canada Festival at BCBC. Our New York City début would not have been possible without a generous underwriting gift from the Metropolitan Life Foundation, the assistance of the Department of External Affairs of Canada and the initiative of the Brooklyn Center for Performing Arts at Brooklyn College.

In his remarks at the opening night reception, Lawrence Gradus thanked Robert Johnstone, Consul General of Canada, and his wife, Popsy, for their continued support of TBC since the days of its «birth» five years ago in Ottawa. He praised BCBC for its co-operative and considerate staff: "This is a terrific facility," he said, "and we look forward to coming back."

As with any tour, there were also gripping behind-the-scene stories, one of which has been immortalized by Timothy Clarkin, dancer and bard-in-residence:

'Tis a short little ditty,
by a not very witty,
dancer of Theatre Ballet.
I was asked to create,
on a page or a slate,
something funny that happened one
day.
This story begins
when a wheel and it's rim,

decided to die with a blow.

All the dancers were jammed, in the very small van, on the way to the N.Y.C. show. While normally we, of this small company, may not scare or easily quiver, we all knew for certain that the tunnel we were in, was still underneath a deep river. As the light became clear, and the story ends hear, the van clunked out from the dim. Now Brooklyn was near, and gone was the fear, of having to go for a swim.

Supplementary OAC Grants for TBC: The company had the good fortune to benefit from the Ontario Arts Council's receipt of additional funds from government to assist in better responding to the needs of small and medium-sized arts organizations throughout the province. TBC is one of six companies participating in a two-year pilot project to stimulate the touring of dance in Ontario, and has been awarded a special grant of \$4,000 to book the Northeast Region in 1986-87. In addition, a supplementary grant of \$3,000 has been approved for the company's choreographic workshop. Dances created during the workshop period will be presented at TBC's studios in January and in

several Ottawa high schools as part of an educational programme on choreography...

Kilgour Residency with the School of Dance a Success: TBC and The School of Dance launched their 1985-86 season with a joint residency project made possible with the assistance of the Ontario Arts Council and the British Council.
